Nursery

Happy New Year to you all.

I would like to give a huge welcome to the children who have started Nursery this week. You have settled into the class beautifully and it is lovely to see you already developing some lovely friendships within the class.

It has been a very chilly start to the term however, this has not stopped us from enjoying and making the most of the snowy weather.

The children have been using different tools to draw their own snowman pictures in the snow as well as practising their letter formation for the letters in their name.

We have been counting the buttons on the snowmen as well as making our own playdough buttons to put the correct number of buttons on the snowmen.

The children have enjoyed practising their number formation for numbers 1-5 and we have been exploring our skills in junk modelling to create models of familiar objects, thinking about the shapes we need and the position they have to go in the create the shape we want.

The children loved going out and stomping in the snow and due to how crunchy the snow was, we enjoyed trying to pick up our footprints and compare the size and pattern left by our wellies.

WOW! What a fantastic first week back in Reception. I have absolutely loved getting to know the children and they have blown me away with their creativity in all areas of their learning.

This week we have started our new story 'The Storm Whale in Winter' by Benji Davis which was delivered to us in a special parcel from Noi. We also received a letter from Noi asking us to help him find his friend who is big and likes to swim. We created a class list of all creatures we thought it might be.

In the creative area the children have been mixing and creating different shades of under the sea colours and their own sea silhouettes. We have also been creating our own whales using different materials and using playdough to create our own cats.

The children also created speech bubbles which introduced themselves to Noi and to Mrs Fairhurst.

Our story introduces some fantastic new vocabulary and we have been performing actions to remember our new words. You can ask the children to show you at home. Our new words include: lighthouse, distance, dragged, rescued, worry and glimpse.

In Maths, the children have been using their counting skills to count backwards from 10, throwing snowballs into buckets and matching amounts to their corresponding numbers and creating their own number lines counting forwards and backwards.

Key Stage 1 News

Year 1

Welcome back and Happy New Year everyone!

This week has been a very cold and snowy week but it did not stop us from having a great week. In Maths this week we have been consolidating our knowledge of subtraction and starting to learn how to find the difference between two numbers. At the start of the week we used cubes and counters to help us and as the week progressed we became much more confident and ended the week using numberlines! We also completed our shape topic by sorting 2D and 3D shapes into two groups and using 2D shapes to create a picture.

In Writing this week we have been using lots of adjectives in sentences, remembering our capital letters full stops and finger spaces. We are becoming much more confident writing independently! We practised our handwriting and letter formation too!

Sadly on Tuesday the pantomime was cancelled so we watched our own pantomime in the classroom and joined in with lots of crafty activities. The PTA were so kind and they came into school to make the whole school hot chocolate and gave us biscuits and marshmallows too!

In History, we discussed our opinions on what we think The Great Fire is. A lot of Year 1 commented on the fact that a fire is not great and questioned what it means. We wrote down our thoughts on this and cannot wait to investigate this further next week!

In Computing, we used the laptops to have a look at a keyboard and we practised writing our names on it. It is harder than it looks but we agreed that practise makes prefect! We also cannot wait to go on them again next week.

In Picture news, we discussed the question 'Is it our responsibility to protect Wildlife?' We had some amazing contributions in this lesson and in the end we all agreed on the pros and cons to protecting our wildlife.

Year 2

Year 2 have had a fantastic first week back!

In Maths, we have carried on our learning on addition and subtraction. We used the hundred squares and bead strings to find a number by counting in steps of ten and then adding the ones. We worked out what we needed to add to make one hundred by then adding on ones until we reached the next ten and then adding tens to reach one hundred. We then moved on to bridging to add and subtract two single digit numbers. We used our number bonds to ten to help us with these sums, practising using part-whole models, number lines and tens frames.

In English, we started our week by recapping all of the skills we learnt last term, such as adjectives, conjunctions, past tense verbs and questions. We then started looking at our new topic all about Christopher Columbus. We read a fact file about Columbus and wrote a description of his portrait using adjectives, trying hard to use more ambitious vocabulary. We learnt that he was a very famous explorer, and we can't wait to learn more about him over the next few weeks!

We started our new topic on Hindu Dharma in RE. We thought about the special events that we celebrate, such as birthdays and Mothers and Father's Day, and why and how we celebrate. We learnt that we celebrate these occasions to show love and devotion to someone, and that both religious and non-religious people can show devotion to other people. We thought about the special people in our lives who we show devotion to.

For History, we carried on our learning about significant individuals by learning about Edith Cavell. We discovered that she was a nurse who saved many lives in Belgium during WWI. We wrote a fact file about Edith, highlighting some of her brave actions such as secretly helping 200 British and French soldiers escape out of Belgium during the war. We learnt that Edith is remembered as a hero because she cared for all soldiers, regardless of whether they were German, French or British.

In Science, we finished our learning on plants by creating a set of instructions to help someone care for a seed. We thought about what our seed investigation before Christmas had told us about what conditions a seed needs to grow and for the plant to carry on growing healthily.

Homework

For our spelling homework this week we are going to recap some words that we have learnt previously but still need a little more practise with. Our Maths homework is a number bond challenge while our English homework focuses on using adjectives.

Key Stage 2 News

Year 3

In English, we have completed a few more lessons in preparation of writing our report on rocks. We have completed more sessions on how to write a subordinate clause and have looked at why subordinate clauses are useful in writing. We have also investigated how to use 'a' or 'an' correctly depending on whether the following word begins with a vowel or a consonant.

In Maths, we have continued to look at how to add a single digit to a 3-digit number using lots of different methods.

In History, we used the iPads to research the archaeological site of Skara Brae- a historical settlement from the Neolithic Era. The children had to research different things relating to how people would have lived in this site all those years ago and they investigated how the houses were built and structured.

In R.E. we have started to look into the religion of Islam, and the children have already discovered some Muslim festivals, where their place of worship is and what the 5 Pillars of Islam is.

Year 4

This week in Year 4, we started the week by writing our newspaper reports about the Boy Who Cried Wolf.

We have then looked at lots of different versions of Cinderella from around the world. The story has had versions dating back over a thousand years and nearly every country around the world has a version. We heard and watched lot of different versions before writing our own.

In History, we have been looking at different facts about Ancient Greece and answering questions about it.

In Science, we have been looking at food chains and have been creating our own chains and labelling with the correct vocabulary such as consumer and producer, prey and predator and their diet such as carnivore, herbivore and omnivore.

In Maths, we have been looking at using the formal method of addition and using exchanges. Mrs Shone has been very, very impressed as the children have been fantastic.

Year 5

Welcome back! I hope you all had a lovely break!

Wow what a crazy week this has been with the wild weather! Considering the weather, we have been excellent and got through lots of work.

In maths, we began our multiplication topic with multiplying and dividing by 10,100 and 1000. We even had a go at doing this with decimals and jumping through the decimal point.

In writing, we started our new topic based on the film 'Hoodwinked!' a twist on the classic Little Red Riding Hood story. We will be writing a diary entry based on Granny's story. We used indefinite pronouns within sentences to understand how they work.

Our geography topic had us looking at the Panama Canal. We looked at where it was in the world and why it was built in the first place. We saw how it helped world trade by cutting so much time for boats travelling from west US to Europe.

Finally, as a special treat, we were able to have a movie afternoon on Friday after being unable to play outside all week due to the ice. We deserved a treat for our excellent behaviour.

Year 6

Year 6 have been learning about the causes and consequences of WW1 by studying Archie's War Scrapbook in History.

We have been reasoning with coordinates, practising long division, and investigating negative numbers in Maths.

In Science, the children have been using classification keys to classify a variety of amphibians and have been investigating different types of microorganisms. They have also used the Linnaean classification system to classify an animal of their choice.

In PSHE, we continued to analyse all the things in life that we should be grateful for and how showing gratitude regularly can have a number of benefits for us.

In English, the children have been practising creating sentences in both the passive and active voice, creating sentences about Walter Tull and his life experiences.

On Friday, the children were introduced to the Big Garden Birdwatch, and the Big School Birdwatch in assembly; this is an annual event organised by the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds (RSPB), with the aim of using data collected by people at home and in schools to help scientists establish bird numbers and locations.

The first Big Garden Birdwatch was 45 years ago. Last year, over half a million people looked out for birds, making Birdwatch the largest citizen wildlife survey in the UK. Birdwatch is a unique collective effort, which helps build a picture of how different birds are doing.

Next week, the children will complete their Science data fieldwork collection for the Birdwatch project.
