Key Stage 1 News

Year 1

This week Year 1 have felt very festive! We have been practising our Christmas Play this week and we can't wait to show you all next week!

In Maths, we have been looking at subtraction facts within 7, 8,9 and even 10! We discussed what a part, part whole model was and how we can use it to write down subtraction calculations. We used different resources to help us solve problems, a number line, bead string and counters.

In History this week we have looked at the history of Buses and how they have changed over time. We used different realistic pictures and placed the dates they were used on a timeline. We now understand what a timeline is and how it is used to order events.

In Writing, we looked at different sentence types and how we can use a question mark. We read different sentences, identified our question words and added in a question mark where it was needed. We also finished our retell of the Naughty Bus story.

In Art this week we made a Christmas decoration. We used different artistic skills to paint and create an animal decoration and we all loved doing this!

In Music, we continued to learn new Christmas songs and even sang a Christmas song in Spanish!

We have taken part in forest school and PE again this week and we loved learning outside again too!

Year 2

In Maths, we have started looking at how we can use our number bonds to 10 to help with addition and subtraction to 100. We know that if 1 + 9 = 10 then 10 + 90 = 100, and we have been using this to help us with subtraction and missing number problems.

We have finished reading our story 'Major Glad, Major Dizzy' this week and have started our final write in English. We started by recapping conjunctions and picking the best conjunction to fit into a sentence. We then reread the letter we received from William, a character in our story, before writing a reply to him. We have tried really hard to include all the skills we have learnt this term such as adjectives, conjunctions and questions. I have been particularly impressed with how hard everyone has been trying with their handwriting!

In geography, we compared and contrasted Brazil and the United Kingdom. We learnt that the Equator separates the Earth into the northern hemisphere and the southern hemisphere, and while Brazil is in South America and has a tropical climate, the UK is in Europe and has a temperate climate. We also looked at the different animals we can find in both countries.

As part of our science learning on plants we looked at the life cycle of a plant. We learnt that a plant has different stages in its life cycle such as seed, germination, growth and seed dispersal. We learnt that germination happens when the conditions for the seeds are just right, and used this understanding to look at the seeds we have planted to decide which conditions are best if we want a seed to grow healthy.

We have also been practising for our Christmas play really hard all week and we are so excited for you all to see it!

Spelling - Please practise this term's spellings using the different strategies we have practised in class. You can use as many different strategies as you'd like or stick to the same one – it's up to you! Maths – Number bonds to 10, 20 and 100.

English – Can you write a description of the Christmas scene using the skills we've learnt this half term?

Please can our Christmas Play story tellers practise their lines. This can be done instead of English homework this week.

Key Stage 2 News

Year 3

In English this week we have looked at creating a range of subordinate clauses related to rocks in order to write our report on rocks. We have also looked at how we can turn statements into questions by using 'how' and 'what'.

In maths, we have carried on looking at mental strategies to add and subtract ones from a 3-digit number.

In history, we have looked at how settlements changed during the Palaeolithic, Mesolithic and Neolithic era and the children had a go at drawing what each of these would have looked like. We learned that tents would have had animal skin and fur over them to help keep them safe and warm from the elements.

In science, we looked at properties of some rocks, sandstone, granite, marble, pumice and chalk, and investigated whether they are permeable, hard wearing, and hard or soft.

We have also had a couple of nice afternoons with some Christmas crafts and songs getting in the Christmas spirit!

There have been a lot of Christmas play rehearsals all week which has taken up a good chunk of our week but all of year 3 have performed our song wonderfully and have remembered all the actions for it!

Year 4

This week in maths, we have been looking at how we can add using number bonds and have looked at adding, 1, 10, 100 and 1000 to 4 -digit numbers. We started using concrete strategies such as number beads to look at how knowing number bonds helps us to bridge. We then looked at the pictorial as used number lines to make the connections before moving on to the abstract mental calculations.

In English, we have been looking at lots of different versions of Medusa and have been looking at phrases that describe her personality, appearance and movement. We have thinking about noun phrases and using adjectives to paint a picture of her appearance. We have been looking at ambitious vocabulary we could use in our future character descriptions and have been using synonyms to expand our vocabulary knowledge.

This week, we have looked at the story of 'The Little Match Girl' we have read the story and had a great discussion about what it was about and how things were very different at the end of the 19th and start of the 20th Century.

We sadly had our last Spanish lesson with Mrs Stewart this week and spent our lesson looking at different shops and used this to create shopping lists. We had a lovely assembly for Mrs Stewart and sang her Feliz Navidad.

Year 5

This week in Year 5, we have been looking at direct speech and punctuating it correctly. We have a catchy song to help us remember all of the correct components.

We have also been looking at poetry and how to perform it rhythmically. We have been practising using intonation so that an audience are engaged and excited by poetry. Next week, we will be performing Gran Can You Rap by Jack Oulsby in a poetry assembly.

In Maths, we have looked at word problems and multi-step problems for addition and subtraction. We searched for key vocabulary to check what the question was asking us to do so that we are ready for our SATs.

For our RE, we recapped the Islamic festival of Ramadan and then looked at Laylatul Qadr - otherwise known as the Night of Power. On this night, Muslims believe that angels descend to the Earth to seek permission from God to recognize the divine blessings on Earth.

Year 6

Year 6 have been consolidating their understanding of coordinates in Maths and have been practising long division.

In English, they have been constructing diary entries, as if they were a soldier in a World War 1 trench, witnessing the miracle of the Christmas Truce. The children used figurative language and thought carefully about their senses in order to build a really good description.

To keep their diary entries as historically accurate as possible, in History, the children continued to study what life was like in the trenches and studied the poetry book, 'The Christmas Truce' by Carol Anne Duffy, as well as closely analysing the famous and once banned poem, 'Dulce Et Decorum Est' by Wilfred Owen.

In Science, the children have continued their skills of classification by separating living things into their specific domain, kingdom, phylum, class, order, family and genus.

The children have also been working tirelessly on putting the finishing touches to their Christmas poem and to preparing performance poetry.

They have also worked with Mrs Blackledge on completing a number of Christmas crafts.

Toy safety

"I would hate for any other child to go through what Becca suffered because of buying dangerous toys via online marketplaces."

Mum of two-year-old Becca who swallowed magnets from a toy

Toys from reputable brands are made to be safe. But if they've come from an unknown seller on an online marketplace, a market or small discount store, they could be dangerous.

Buying safely

- Buy toys from brand names you know. If you've never heard of the seller or the brand and price is really tempting, it could be dangerous
- Watch out for cheap copies of popular toys. They may not be made to UK safety standards.
- Check if the toy has been removed from sale because it's unsafe. Visit gov.uk and search 'product recalls'
- If you buy something that looks unsafe, trust your instincts and send it back.



Babies and toddlers are curious and naturally put everything in their mouths. So dangerous toys can pose the biggest risk to small children. Be especially careful when buying for under 3s.

Watch out for missing or contradictory age warnings. If a toy is pictured with a toddler but marketed as unsuitable for young children, pick something else.

Which toys are most dangerous?

- Toys with:
 - accessible button batteries that can burn through your child's food pipe
 - super strong magnets that can rip through your child's belly
 - · long cords that can strangle your child
 - small parts that can choke your small child
- Water beads that can block your child's bowel if swallowed
- Electrical toys with exposed wires or chargers that can catch fire.









Checking toys

If you're unsure about the safety of a toy, here are some checks you can do:

- Check battery compartments for accessible button batteries or loose spares in the box
- Check for any loose small magnets
- Give the parts on the toy a quick tug and check for small parts that come off
- 🖐 Look for long cords or access to stuffing
- Check if there are any age restrictions or safety warnings on the product.
