Early Years News

Nursery

This week we have been reading the book Busy Penguins. The children have loved creating actions to retell the story and after making their own stained glass penguins, we took photographs of these actions to create our own story map for the book.

The children have made their own standing penguins as well as learning how to draw and paint a penguin. They have also made some lovely playdough models of penguins using card and paper to add the features.

In maths we have been subitising amounts 1-3 and the children have demonstrated lovely examples of turn taking whist playing the dice game that involved moving their penguin along the bottle top iceberg path until they reach the water.

We have also been counting how many fish are trapped in the icebergs and the children have explored different ways of getting the ice to melt faster including using cold water, warm water, salt and the warmth of their hands.

The children have also been feeding the correct number of fish to the penguins as well as making families of penguins to match the amount on each iceberg on the playdough table.

We have been identifying images that begin with the letter p and sticking them onto the penguin and the children have been drawing picture of things they are good at after learning about all the things that a penguin can do.

We have been finding out about Antarctica and the children have been able to recall all the facts we have discovered including where Antarctica is situated on the planet, why there are no people living there permanently and what animals you would expect to see if you went there.

Reception

In reception this week, we have delved deeper into the story 'The Storm Whale in Winter' story and talked about what happens at the beginning, middle and the end of the story. In writing we have worked with Mrs Fairhurst and Miss Taylor to write our own speech bubble for our favourite character.

We have sequenced pictures to put the book back together again and completed our own story maps. Noi sent us a message on Monday to tell us that he was stuck in the middle of the sea, and we had to find a way to help him. The children had lots of ideas and created bridges and maps to help him find his way.

In the creative area this week we have been designing our boats ready to make our own out of junk modelling. We will be testing our boats to see if they sink or float and we've created some fabulous boats in the playdough area with sails, anchors and planks.

In Maths we have continued to count backwards from different numbers, and we have found missing numbers on a number line. We are also practising our number formation for those trickier numbers.

Key Stage 1 News

Year 1

In Maths this week we have been counting backwards and forwards to 20, using numicon to help us represent numbers. We noticed that each number after the number 9 had a ten in it. We are going to use this knowledge to help us next week to identify tens and ones in different numbers. Later on in the week we looked at how to find a missing number in a calculation and represent this on a part, part whole model and a tens frame.

In Writing, we received a very interesting letter from the Naughty Bus and he told us he had gone back to London to be with his family. We annotated his letter and were able to use some of the features in our own letters. We wrote our own letters back to him on Tuesday and even added in our own questions! Later on in the week we used our knowledge of questions to find out more information about a horse and cart picture that was left in our classroom. We made sure we used the correct punctuation and capital letters and finger spaces. We also investigated different nouns

and sorted words into three different groups, people, places and things. We then were able to identify these words in sentences and use them in our own sentences.

In Science we talked about the different seasons and discussed what the weather would be like in each season. We then looked at different weather symbols and we able to identify what each symbol meant.

In PSHE, we discussed what the word appreciation meant and how we can show gratitude during each day. We were creative in sharing our ideas by drawing posters.

In Computing we used the IPADs to practise our skills searching for apps, using a keyboard and typing. We really enjoyed this and all found this quite easy!

To end the week we started our 'First chapter Fridays' where we read the first chapter of a book. We discussed our predictions about the book and we cant wiat to find our what happens next week!

Year 2

In Maths this week, Year 2 have been using dienes and arrow cards to partition numbers when adding 2 digit numbers and tens together. The children worked very hard this week to use different methods to partition 2 digit numbers and add on tens.

In English we are learning about Christopher Columbus this week. We have enjoyed looking at question sentences and then writing some of these sentences about him ourselves whilst practising using our question marks and question words.

During Science this week, we have completed our end of unit science assessment for our last topic which was plants. We have also started our new science topic which is Animals including humans.

We have also been practising our handwriting more this week and we are very pleased with the children's progression- well done Year 2, keep up the great work!

We have also very much enjoyed spending time outside this week after the dreadful weather last week!

Key Stage 2 News

Year 3

In English this week, we have finally gotten around to writing our rocks report. The children collectively came up with a success criteria they should follow in order to complete the outcomes. All children made sure to include at least 2 sub-headings as questions and a 'big fact' box.

In maths, we have continued looking at mental strategies to help us add ones and tens to a threedigit number. Soon we will be moving onto written methods.

In History, we used the laptops to research Stonehenge and the children created an informative mind map on all the fascinating facts they found out about it.

In science, the children looked at the formation of soil and competed a task explaining what each layer of soil was and what was inside it.

We did a lesson on 'personal space' and boundaries this week in PSHE to help the children better understand to keep their hands and feet to themselves.

In music the children have continued to learn about Bob Marley and the Whalers and have tried so hard in learning the chorus of 'Three Little Birds' on the ukulele.

Year 4

This week in Maths, we have been looking at subtraction using the column method. We have looked first at just how we set up the column and practised using subtraction without any exchanging. We then moved on to looking how we make one exchange and then on to multiple exchanges. Whilst we looked at these calculations we thought about whether a column would be the best method and whether we could use mental strategies or strategies such as compensating.

In English, we have been looking at personification and how we can give human qualities to inanimate objects, nature and animals. We practised spotting personification before creating examples of our own about Medusa's cave. We then looked at how we can improve simple phrases by adding adjectives, expanded noun phrases, similies and personification.

In Science, we have completed our topic on animals including humans and have completed our end of topic assessment.

In History, we have been looking at the different forms of government in Ancient Greece and have looked at oligarchy, tyranny, monarchy and the introduction of democracy.

Year 5

This week in Year 5 we have been using our times table facts. We used them to help us solve larger sums such as $1200 \div 200$ and 4×6000 . We also had a go at doubling and halving large numbers mentally and using multiplication/division.

In writing, we used onomatopoeia to create sentences based around Little Red Riding Hood. We then used subordinate clauses to improve our writing.

For our history topic, we looked at how town names have certain endings which indicate whether they are Viking, Anglo Saxon or Roman names. Warrington ends in 'ton' which is usually an indication that a place is Anglo Saxon!

In geography, we used the VRs to 'visit' Niagara Falls. We learnt some fun facts about this amazing place, including that there are 3 waterfalls altogether and that 125,000 gallons of water pass over the waterfall each second!

Finally, in Spanish, we have been looking at fruit and vegetables. We asked children in the class what their favourite fruit/vegetable was and created a bar chart based on our results!

Miss Ratcliffe

Year 6

In Science, the children have been carrying out further investigation into useful and harmful microorganisms. The children researched their chosen infectious disease, looking at which micro-organism was responsible, how the disease spread, what the prognosis of the disease was, what methods could be used for prevention, where it was found in the World and what treatment can be used for its cure.

In PSHE, the children considered what they have to be grateful for at Bruche and looked in more depth at the benefits of showing gratitude. Gratitude can reduce stress, anxiety and increase feelings of contentment. It can lower blood pressure, improve sleep, and strengthen the immune system. It can also increase empathy, improve communication, and strengthen bonds with friends and family, as well as helping people decrease negative emotions like envy, resentment, and frustration. The children considered all the things at Bruche that they can be thankful for and created a 'Bruche Gratitude' poster.

In Maths, the children continued to work with negative numbers, reasoning and problem solving. They went on to learning about the properties of circles and were able to reason and problem solve with circles by finding the circumference of circles and the perimeter of semi-circles by multiply the diameter by the pi.

In History, the children investigated the main factors that led to the end of WW1. They also examined the consequences of the war and considered how the terms of the Treaty of Versailles led to the start of WW2. The children have begun to write newspaper articles as if they were journalists living at the end of the WW1, reporting on why the war finally ended with peace.

For Geography and Science, the children also completed their Birdwatch surveys, collecting data on the variety and amount of birds found in our school grounds. This data will be submitted to the RSPB.
