Nursery

In maths, the children have been exploring repeating patterns using a range of objects including autumnal objects. The children have been continuing patterns and making their own.

Key Stage 1 News

Year 1

This week Year 1 have been very busy working on their key skills. In Maths, we have been writing numbers and ensuring our number formation is correct. We have created our own number lines, ordered numbers to 10 and estimated where numbers would be on a blank number line.

In Writing, we have learnt what an adjective is and learnt how to identify these words in simple sentences. This week we also found out that the Naughty Bus had been on an adventure to different places. We used adjectives and nouns to describe the places he had been and even wrote these words in sentences.

In Science this week we have labelled different parts of our body. We used chalk and worked in partners to draw around each other and labelled the body parts on the playground. We loved working as a team for this activity. Later on in the week we looked at the different months and seasons.

In Music, we were all given an instrument to play. We played the instruments to the beat and tried to keep up with the rhythm of the song. We all sang beautifully in assembly too!

In Computing this week, we talked about what a laptop is and had a look at the different features.

During our creative time this week we talked about how excited we all were for the Halloween Disco. We drew our own pictures to represent how we were feeling and used pens, crayon and pencils to make our pictures colourful.

Homework: There will be no homework on Seesaw this week but please continue to read with your child and write in their diary over half term.

Year 2

In maths this week Year 2 have continued our learning on non-standard partitioning by investigating how we can exchange tens for ones to partition numbers in different ways. We then recapped odd and even numbers, remembering that even numbers end in 0,2,4,6,8 and odd numbers end in 1,3,5,7,9. We used this understanding to help us when we began counting in 2's.

In our writing and history lessons we have finished our learning about Queen Elizabeth II by writing a diary entry from her perspective. We worked hard to include the key grammar skills we have been learning this term, such as conjunctions, adjectives, the -ed suffix and capital letters and full stops. We also created a timeline of the Queen's life by placing key events in chronological order.

In RE, we have finished our topic on Christianity by thinking about our own hopes and concerns for the world. We made a class pledge of little actions that we can all do to help the planet. In RSHE, we learnt about sun safety, despite the very rainy weather we have had this week! We discussed how being out in the sun is good for us because it provides use with vitamin D and helps us be active outside, but that we must make sure we keep our selves safe by wearing a hat, sunglasses, suncream, long sleeves and having a drink regularly.

In Science this week we have learnt about different properties of materials. We learnt that many objects are made of more than one material and that these are chosen because of their suitability. We looked at some objects found around school and in our classroom and discussed what materials they were made out of and what properties they had which made them suitable and useful.

In Computing, we looked at all the different places we might find IT in the world. We looked at examples of IT that can be found both outside and inside and thought about all the jobs that use IT. We tried to think of some jobs that don't use any IT but found this very hard – I wonder if anyone can think of one?

<u>Homework</u>

For our half term spelling homework please practice this term's spellings using the range of spelling strategies. Children may want to focus on the spellings that they still find tricky. Our maths homework recaps some of our learning on place value while our English homework is handwriting practice.

Key Stage 2 News

Year 3

In English this week we have continued to examine our new text Seal Surfer. We've used prepositions to express time, place and cause to rewrite the opening of the story. We've also looked at different verbs to describe how sea animals move and with this, we looked at a poem named Seal by Robert Frost which uses a variety of verbs to describe how seals move.

In maths, we've been focusing on number lines, both scaled and unscaled and we have been plotting known facts to help us estimate numbers. The children have been working so hard at labelling the midpoints on their number lines to help them.

In History, we've looked at the different Stone Age tools that would have been used and we've looked at how they would have been used.

In R.E, we have looked at prophets and focused this week on the prophet Moses. We explored how God spoke to him and looked at the history of his life.

Year 4

This week in English, we have been looking at using high quality fronted adverbials and creating sentences that we could use in our retell of the Hare and Tortoise, we thought about ambitious vocabulary we could use in those sentences. We then moved on to punctuating direct speech and how we use reporting clauses to tell us who said something and how using different synonyms of said can change how something is said. We then have planned our big write all ready to retell our different version of the Hare and the Tortoise.

In Maths, we have been looking at scaled number lines and thinking about counting the increments to work out what scale the number line is using. From this we can then work out a range of other number scales we might see in ordinary life such as scales, measuring jugs, clocks, thermometers and bar charts. We have then moved onto rounding; we have started by refamiliarising ourselves with rounding to the nearest 10 or 100 and we took part in a Blooket battle.

In Geography, we have been creating non-chronological reports about our choice of European biome and Mrs Shone has been very impressed with our effort.

In Music, we have been continuing with our ukulele lessons and have been looking at Taylor Swift's Shake it Off as well as Oasis' Blackbird.

We have ended our week and our first half term with a fabulous art day with Mrs Jones. Where we have been looking at Greek pottery, how they were made and decorated before designing and making our own.

Year 5

This week in Year 5 we have consolidated our learning of place value. We are now ready to start adding and subtracting after the half term.

In writing, we wrote an informative text about magical items. We used the book Podkin One Ear to help us to create our own magical weapons and tools. We then created facts about the tools abilities and the location they could be found.

In RE we learnt about the Christian story "The Lost Son". We learnt how the father excepted his apologetic son back into his family even after he spent all of his money. The parable is designed to teach everyone that God accepts those who apologise for their sins.

Our spelling lesson focused on the etymology of words. We looked at where words such as ketchup, adder and bungalow came from.

Year 6

Year 6 have been investigating a variety of different biomes across South America, including the Falklands and the Atacama Desert to emphasise that the continent is not simply covered in rainforest.

They have also been examining how there is great diversity in the climate of Brazil, as you move from region to region, emphasising the vastness of the country.

In Maths, the children have been retrieving the learning covered over the past few weeks, looking at the four operations of fractions and BIDMAS.

The children had a yoga session for wellbeing week on Thursday with Mrs Melia which was fabulous!

In Computing the children have been looking at ESafety and how you keep a good online reputation.

The children completed their balanced arguments on whether or not Darwin should have risked his life to travel on the HMS Beagle on his quest to find evidence to prove his theory of evolution.

Also, in Science the children further investigated inheritance and characteristics that can be influenced by genetics and those that are influenced by diet.


They also carried out an experiment to highlight how natural selection happens, mimicking the evolution of the Galapagos finches.

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about RROR FILMS & AGE RATINGS

'on-demand' availability of streaming platforms in many homes creates extra possibilities for young viewers to be exposed to age-inappropriate content. Material which features horror or violence can cause anxiety and nightmares for children, especially since it can be hard for young ones to grasp that what they're watching isn't real.

CLASSIFICATION BREAKDOWN

The British Board of Film Classification has the following age ratings: U: Suitable for all ages

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PG: For children aged 8 and above; this content shouldn't unsettle them 12A: Children under the age of 12 should not watch without an adult; this content potentially features bad language, nudity or sexual references

15: Suitable only for 15-year-olds and above

18: Exclusively for an adult audience, with potentially explicit themes of violence, nudity or sex

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

STREAMING IS EVERYWHERE

Modern mobile devices make it very easy for children to watch streamed films without the need for a TV. The availability of inappropriate content has risen significantly on streaming platforms, almost all of which host 18-rated content. If not restricted by parental controls, this could be viewed by children who aren't quite ready for such adult themes, concepts and imagery.

FACT VS. FICTION

fact from fiction. However, with modern day technology making pretend violence and horror look ever more realistic, it's becoming harder for youngsters to tell the difference. For instance, consider remakes of older films, where dated special effects (making) it easy to discern that something wasn't real) have been replaced by far more convincing monsters and gore.

PEER PRESSURE

Friends encouraging each other to watch the latest film featuring violence or horror can lead to children consuming content that they're not ready for. As 18+ content is available on many streaming platforms, youngsters can watch these together – potentially without their parents' or carers' knowledge.

CHILDREN SCARE DIFFERENTLY

It can be difficult to decide what content is appropriate for children. What's fine for one child could be extremely frightening for another. As many children admit to not sharing or discussing the content they watch with their parents, encouraging an open dialogue around the kind of media that young people consume can help avoid exposing them to any inappropriate content.

PSYCHOLOGICAL IMPACTS (De)

Horror prides itself on its ability to startle or induce genuine fear in the viewer – so it's no surprise that this genre isn't usually intended for children. A natural side-effect of this is that 'jump scares' or a creepy, suspenseful atmosphere can have lasting effects on younger minds. The resulting anxiety can impact a child's sleeping patterns or eating habits.

Advice for Parents & Educators

WATCH THE FILM FIRST

If you're concerned that a film might be unsuitable for children (whether it's their first dive into the horror genre or a step up in age classification), then take a look for yourself. There's no better way to judge whether this content is something you'd deem appropriate for a child – and if a parent, for example, has actually seen the film (or at least a portion of it), they can construct a far more crea case if they decide it's inappropriate.

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DISCUSS THE CONTENT OF FILMS

If a child has seen a film that you think may have exposed them to potentially uncomfortable themes and ideas, don't shy away from talking about it, and answer any questions they may have. This is especially important if they watched the film without an adult present. Ask them to summarise the story for you, as this will give you an understanding of what they've learned from watching it.

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REMEMBER - IT'S NOT REAL

TOO SCARED?

Emphasise to children that the content they're viewing is entirely fictional and has no chance of affecting them in real life. If a child is upset after watching a film, try to understand what exactly has unsettled them: this can help you approach the topic in a healthy and informative manner to dispel any fears or anxieties they may have.

USE PARENTAL CONTROLS

2 Most streaming platforms have the option to put age ranges on children's accounts. This means that films and shows that are inappropriate for children won't be advertised while they're browsing and won't even appear if a child specifically searches for them. This can be changed any time at parents' discretion, but it's wise to protect these settings with a password, so a child can't alter anything on their own.



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
