Key Stage 1 News

Year 1

In Maths, we have continued to learn how to find systematic subtraction facts to 7, 8, 9 and 10. We are now much more confident using these. We also practised number bonds to 4 and 5 and represented them using a part—part—whole model. In addition, we solved some tricky arithmetic problems by adding two numbers together and consolidated our use of number lines. In Writing, we have been building our confidence with our Read Write Inc. sounds and using them to spell different words. We practised writing words that include special friends and used them in full sentences. Some children even challenged themselves by adding a conjunction to extend their writing!

In Music, we consolidated our understanding of crescendos and know that they are used when music gradually gets louder. We also revisited decrescendos (or diminuendos), which are used when music gradually gets softer. We clapped along to a steady beat and were able to identify when a crescendo appeared in the song.

On Wednesday, we enjoyed a whole day of outdoor learning. It was wonderful to spend time exploring the natural environment, and we discovered so much through hands-on activities. On Thursday afternoon, we had a festive art session. We developed our fine motor skills through cutting and sticking to create beautiful Christmas cards. The children loved making these together! Each day we have also been practising our Christmas play, and we cannot wait to share the final performance with you!

Year 2

In Maths this week, we have looked at the relationship between number bonds to 10 and number bonds to 20. We identified that if we know our number bonds to 10, then this can help us with our number bonds to 20, 30,40 and so on!

In History, we have looked at the final significant individal of our topic, Isambard Kingdom Brunel. The children learnt that he was an engineer and designed The Clifton Suspension Bridge, became the Chief engineer of the Great Western Railway and he built the SS Great Britain which is still docked in Bristol.

We have also practiced our play a lot this week too ensuring we are learning our lines and songs ready for next week.

In Spanish, we have looked at the names of sea creatures. After practicing saying them, the children then drew their favourite 2 animals and labelled them.

In Music the children carried on learning about rhythm and beats and worked well with each other to answer Mr Lynch's retrieval questions.

Key Stage 2 News

Year 3

We have been learning how to use the column method for addition during our Maths learning this week. We started by lining our numbers up into their ones, tens and hundreds, and then adding the ones together, before adding the tens and hundreds. We then moved onto practising addition where we have to make one exchange by moving a ten across into the next column. We have been very impressed with everyone's resilience and effort when tackling these problems!

In RE we heard some more stories about the Prophet Muhammed. We listened to the stories of 'the crying camel' and 'the spider and the cave' and discussed what these stories teach Muslims about Prophet Muhammed and how they should act with him as their role model.

We learnt about soil in our Science lesson this week. We learnt that soil is essential for all life on earth, and is made up of air, water and minerals. We discovered that soil consists of different layers, which are slightly different from each other. We labelled a diagram with the different layers of organic matter, topsoil, subsoil, parent material and bedrock, and matched up their definitions.

We have also been very busy practising our Christmas performance, and can't wait to show it to you next week!

Year 4

This week in Year, in English we have been planning our last big write of 2025. We have written our plans step by step for our five paragraphs and have started our outsider narrative.

In Maths, we have been perfecting our addition using column addition, we have now been able to do multiple exchanges and Mrs Shone has been really impressed with us and how well we have picked it up. We have done lots of practise and have been using our knowledge on reasoning, problemsolving and word problems.

In Science, we have been making our own digestive systems using tights, orange juice, crackers and bananas and we were able to observe how the body churns food into smaller pieces and how nutrients and water are extracted in the small and large intestine before the waste is excrete through the rectum and anus.

We have also began our investigation into what liquids cause the most damage to teeth. We have set up some eggs to replicate teeth as their shells are similar to enamel. We have used the same amount of liquid in each glass of water, fresh orange, coke, vinegar and black coffee. We made predictions about which liquid we thought was the most damaging to teeth and why. We have then been observing the eggs each day and recording what changes we can see each day.

In Monday, we had a brilliant trip to Chester Zoo. We were incredibly lucky with the weather as the sun shined all day until the trip home. We began our day going to visit our class animal the Komodo dragons. We were so fortunate as the keeper was there along with a volunteer who told us lots of information about our animal. He was so pleased we had chosen the Komodo as only 1500 are now left and have recently been placed on the endangered list and so many people only show interest in fluffy animals. We then visited the snow leopard hoping to get a glimpse of the baby but we only managed a tail. We then were very lucky to see the sloths being very active and having a climb and a feed. The penguins were giddy and were putting on a fantastic fun display with their diving, zooming and splashing. We then made it to the monkeys on the way back and they were having great fun playing.

Mrs Shone

Year 5

This week in Year 5, we have been using the column method to subtract. We had to be careful to make sure we were carrying correctly!

In writing, we wrote a letter from the perspective of a father to his son. We had to use modal verbs, commas/brackets for parenthesis and verb prefixes. We also used formal vocabulary to make our letter sound extra posh and to fit with the era that the letter was supposed to have come from.

For our history topic, we looked at the hierarchy of the Vikings. We learnt that there were three tiers of classes: the Jarls, Karls and Thralls and that the Jarls could be overthrown as the leaders if they were deemed to be not honourable.

In Spanish, we recapped our knowledge of the places that we have learnt in the city. We had to use our listening skills to listen to a Spanish conversation and pick out the places that were mentioned.

Finally, in reading, we have been focussing on poems and picking out some key vocabulary. We have made inferences to answer questions about the poems.

Year 6

Year 6 have been bringing history to life by writing diary entries from the perspective of a soldier in a World War I trench. They analysed a soldier's daily timetable to understand life on the front line and studied the poem Dulce et Decorum Est to explore figurative language. Using this knowledge, they crafted vivid paragraphs full of sensory detail, allowing readers to step into the shoes of those who lived through this pivotal moment in history.

In History, the children explored sources about the Christmas Truce. They studied The Christmas Truce by Carol Ann Duffy and watched the short animated film War Games, analysing the characters' emotions and how they evolved throughout the story. This helped them understand how initial enthusiasm for war gradually gave way to the harsh realities of life on the front line.

Year 6 have been getting into the festive spirit this week with Mrs Blackledge, creating a wonderful array of Christmas crafts. Pupils designed their own Christmas cards and made beautiful stained-glass—effect tree ornaments, showing off their creativity and attention to detail. The classroom has been full of sparkle, colour, and Christmas cheer!

Year 6 have had an exciting week at Chester Zoo, where they brought their Geography and Science learning to life in the most engaging way! Alongside Year 4 earlier in the week, they embarked on a wildlife adventure, exploring the wonders of the natural world and gaining a deeper understanding of global biodiversity.

Pupils investigated the causes of biodiversity loss around the planet and learned how small actions can make a big difference in protecting our environment. It was a truly inspiring experience for all involved.
